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Introduction

Happy Grammar is a student-friendly, four-book series that supports early learners in the first stages of English language development. It emphasizes communicative picture-based activities that practice and reinforce grammar points. The pictorial method used in this book is based on a thorough understanding of language structure and how language is successfully learned. Each eight-page unit in the *Happy Grammar* series includes two lessons.

Grammar Target

Each lesson begins with a visual representation of the grammar concept where students can easily learn the fundamentals of English grammar. The grammar presentation is then followed by several pages of exercises.

Q How many dogs are there?

A There's **one** box.

A There are **two** boxes.

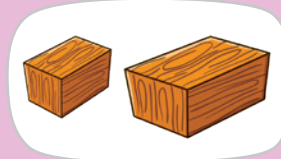

A There are two woods. (✗)

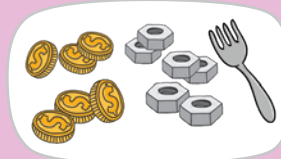
There is **some** wood. (✓)

Q How much metal is there?

A There are three metals. (✗)

There is **a lot of** metal. (✓)

- **Food:** bread, butter, cheese, chocolate, fish, meat, ice cream, yogurt
- **Liquids:** coffee, milk, oil, soup, tea
- **Particles/Grains:** flour, hair, rice, salt, sand, sugar
- **Materials:** glue, metal, paper, wood, wool

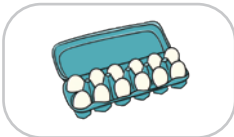

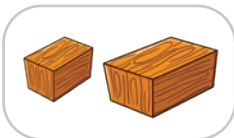
